Udderly Caffeinated also moved into a space uniquely their own in May of this year, purchasing a building on Main Street in New Salem that previously housed a law firm. The newly renovated space is charming and offers plenty of space for their array of quirky retail items. With miles of wood paneling and three separate roofing systems to work around - Malinda, Nolan and their construction partner, Chad Dietrich of Creative Construction, dove in to an exciting but considerable renovation project. The building has stood on Main Street in New Salem since 1900 and held many different businesses; this was not its first renovation rodeo.

The renovation project began with a tiny scrap of paper. Malinda sketched out her ideas for Chad and he made it happen. With Malinda selecting every detail, Udderly Caffeinated on Main Street came to life. The new space offers more than double the amount of kitchen space of their original leased location and made possible a commercial grade kitchen that only Malinda's culinary degree can fully appreciate. The extra space has allowed their operations to grow significantly, adding full-time baker, Debbie, to the Udderly Caffeinated family this year.

The offerings of Udderly Caffeinated continually evolve and expand. Their bright red door welcomes all, from high school kids needing their daily iced coffee fix to the bankers looking for a fresh baked treat (we like our sweets at Security First Bank – bring on the donuts). Malinda has a dreamer's heart, fierce work ethic and a passion for her community. 
## PayPal: Keeping Your Account Safe

You're scrolling through your inbox, and get an <a href="mailto:email">email</a> warning you that your PayPal account has been compromised. You start to panic, as all your credit and debit cards are attached to your account. After reading the email, you realize that all you must do to secure your account is follow the link and log in using your email and password.

#### Seems easy enough, right?

Unfortunately, this email may be the actual threat. Scammers have created numerous PayPal scams to take advantage of the popular payment platform's users, including:

- 1. Overpayment scams
- 2. Fake verification scams
- 3. Shipping address scams
- 4. Fake payment scams
- 5. Advance payment scams
- 6. Smishing scams
- 7. Fake promotional offer scams
- 8. Hacked account scams
- 9. Payment pending scams
- 10. Vishing scams
- 11. Fake charity scams
- 12. Fake refund scams



#### How do I know if a PayPal email is real?

In simple terms, a PayPal email is real if it comes from a "paypal.com" email address. Because sophisticated email scammers may be able to impersonate PayPal's official email address, it's crucial to look for other signs of a scam, <u>see above</u>.

#### Not all PayPal transactions are created equal.

When paying someone unknown to you through PayPal for goods or services, never pay via a *friends and family* transaction type (minimal or no fee). You should always pay via a *goods and services* transaction type; a fee is assessed, but payments are covered by the PayPal Purchase Protection. When a person pays via *friends and family*, a bank is unable to dispute these transactions because PayPal classifies the payment as non-refundable. Venmo and other cash apps have similiar policies based on transaction type.

## How to Reduce Your Risk of Online Identity Theft

You can minimize your risk of online identity theft by remembering the following tips.

#### **Limiting disclosed information**

Never respond to unsolicited requests for personal information, such as your banking ID, account number, username or password, even if they appear to originate from your bank, government agencies or companies with which you have a relationship.

#### Using strong and unique passwords

Create strong, complex passwords for online accounts, and avoid reusing the same password across multiple platforms. Consider using a password manager to securely store and generate unique passwords.

#### Taking advantage of security features

Enable the strongest multi-factor authentication offered, and enable it through a trusted mobile device, an authenticator app, or a secure token.

#### Using two-factor authentication

Enable two-factor authentication whenever possible. This adds an extra layer of security by requiring a second form of verification, such as a code sent to your mobile device, in addition to your password.

#### **Guarding against phishing attempts**

Be cautious of suspicious emails, messages, or calls asking for personal information. Avoid clicking on links or downloading attachments from unknown sources. Verify the legitimacy of any requests before providing sensitive information.
